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Comprehension Strategies

To introduce her subject, Jo passed out a basket of various objects. She asked each participant to choose one, look at it, and see what message it suggested concerning our work and relationship with our students.

The sharing was varied. From this, Jo explored the meaning of comprehension, and the various patterns that could help the student comprehend the written and spoken word in story or conversation.

The key to reading comprehension is in making connections. This must occur in three areas: alphabetic (decoding the printed word), fluency and in recognition of vocabulary. The result is some measure of comprehension.

When teaching for comprehension one must be aware of:

- 1) the perceptions of both the reader and the tutor
- 2) the text to be comprehended
- 3) the activity in which the comprehension is taking place.

For this to be successful, it is important that the tutor guides the student by modeling with pictures, hand movements and other examples, by providing practice for the student to demonstrate some degree of comprehension, and by monitoring the development.

Since we all think differently, it is helpful for the tutor to think out loud. This puts the student at ease, and encourages him to think differently and yet to come to some of the same conclusions. It makes it clear that there are many ways to think and discover, so they have no need to fear making a mistake.

Jo's eagerness to communicate her own love for and methods of teaching kept everyone alert and eager to try some of these techniques with their own students. At the end of the conference she still had more to share and offered some books and papers which she had with her. Barb Baldwin picked up some materials which are now available at the Literacy Center.



What's New in the Resource Center?

Our Resource Center has recently been reorganized to make it more user friendly. All supplementary materials have been organized into areas of reading comprehension, bi-lingual books, professional books, conversation, writing skills, and miscellaneous materials. Each book has a sticker with one of the above areas on the cover for easy return. A handy updated Resource Center Guide will be e-mailed or mailed to you for reference.

Books on CD and CD players are ready to be checked out. Titles were listed in the May "Star." All books have interest levels from middle school through adult.

Level 1 is written at first to second grade level, while level 2 books are at third to fourth grade level. Each CD has two speeds (directions are on the CD) and most stories are 30 minutes long or less. Complete withdrawal details are available at Hillcrest School on the top of the book case that stores the CD's.

If you live in the Casco area or west of Casco and cannot get to Hillcrest School, call Bob (845-2516) and he will pick up any Resource Center materials for you.

Remodeling of the Resource Center has been completed and the new windows give the center a new, bright perspective.

Student Wins in Essay Contest

On May 12, 2009, Bob Garfinkel and his student traveled to Milwaukee to attend the awards ceremony for the MATC Essay Contest. Ninety-one adult literacy students (ESL, GED students from State Technical Schools and GED students from correctional systems) received awards for the essays they submitted. A total of 360 essays were submitted. Students were given a beautiful certificate, pocket dictionary, and a photo of the student receiving the award. The collection of winning essays was published in an attractive book called, "The Fabric of Life" which can be found at our Resource Center, Bob's house, and at the Algoma and Kewaunee Public Libraries. Our winning essay, "My Dreams Came True," was featured in the May edition of the "Star."

When asked about his student's recognition, Bob said, "I was so proud of my student when his name was called to go up on stage. People applauded and cheered each recipient. On that night, we were all tutors, family and published authors. The entire experience was just wonderful!"

Muriel Seidl's student also submitted an essay in this contest. Although his story was not selected, all students submitting stories were winners. The following is Muriel's student's essay. He is a highly motivated ESL student, has been in the program about a year, and has finished two levels in Laubach. Congratulations Muriel and her student for their hard work and effort!

My name is Student X. I am 32 years old and I live in Casco, Wisconsin. I came here from Honduras in December of 2005. I then lived in Maryland. There I lived 1 year working in construction. Later I came here to Wisconsin and started work on the farms. My second year in Wisconsin, I had the opportunity to start learning English. This has helped me feel more secure in this country and at my job. I feel very happy to know English.

I have my books and my teacher Muriel has been helping me a lot to learn much better English. Each day I learn more and use more English, but there is more I want to know. My family in Honduras is very proud of me. My mom, my dad, my wife, my son, and my seven siblings have received some pictures of the party where I got my diploma in the second level (Recognition Day). Well now I am in the third level. I thank Mr. Bob Garfinkel for the opportunity he gave me. I want to use my time wisely and learn a lot in this language.

Just before the printing of this newsletter, we received an email that the Key Newspaper and the essay contest for next year have been ended due to budget cuts. Maybe it's time for us to put together our own book?
